Sutter County Children & Families Commission, together with Strategies, provided the Strengthening Families: An Introduction to the Protective Factors training to funded program staff and collaborative partners as a means to build the capacity and increase the effectiveness of child abuse and neglect prevention and family strengthening services and practice in Sutter County. Providing the training will improve and enhance service delivery and improve organizational effectiveness concerning child abuse and neglect prevention. Moreover, implementing the Five Protective Factors approach among funded programs and its staff will serve as a powerful tool to increase collaboration among all agencies/programs, engage parent leaders more consistently and link local community resources more effectively. The training will help to build a workforce with common knowledge and language at every level within the community support services.

Mini-grant funds were disseminated to fund projects, programs and events benefitting pregnant women, children prenatal through age five and their families in Sutter County.

**What was the intended result of the service? What was the community impact of the service?**



**For Fiscal Year July 1, 2014 - June 30, 2015**

Project SAFE (Smoke-free And Family-friendly Environment) was to provide on-site training, cessation materials, and monthly technical support visits by Sutter County Health Educators to Sutter County pediatric/prenatal providers to improve the efficacy of their efforts to assist pregnant women and their families in creating a healthy tobacco-free environment for themselves and their children. In addition to the common issue of tobacco cessation, a new related problem has surfaced: use of electronic or e-cigarettes/hookah pens, or "vaping". The purpose of the SAFE project was to give to healthcare providers and frontline staff the confidence, skills and tools needed to empower patients to quit smoking. Sutter County Tobacco Control Program conducted trainings to providers to implement "Ask, Advise, Refer" protocol. In addition to the in-services, Program Specialist staff provided to each office approximately 10-15 packets weekly, or as needed, targeted tobacco cessation materials.

**Provide the most recent compelling service outcome available for this service.**

Smart Start was designed to provide a preschool experience to students who have little or no preparation for kindergarten. In a classroom with both preschool and kindergarten teachers, students in Smart Start participate in early literacy and numeracy activities. They also become familiar with the classroom setting, classroom rules, teacher roles, socialization, and separation from their parents. Classes are held four hours a day, five days a week, for four weeks. In addition, parents can attend up to three workshops that familiarize them with what their students are learning, as well as provide additional education on a variety of topics designed to help them prepare their child for a positive school experience.

The 2014 program year marked the thirteenth time Smart Start has been offered in Sutter County. Eight classes were held at eight schools and attended by 186 students. Classes were held in the communities of Live Oak, Sutter, and Yuba City.

**Provide the comparison data used to determine whether the service outcome was an improvement and specify the origin of the data.**

Pre-to-post Walker Assessment Scale (WAS) results, assessing school adjustment levels, showed that Smart Start was responsible for a gain from the 9th percentile at pre to the 34th percentile at post, a significant 25 percentile increase. This demonstrates that (1) as predicted by the program model, students began the program significantly below the statewide average, proving their high level of need, and (2) the program brought the student average closer to the statewide norm for kindergarten entry--the 50th percentile.

**Describe the measurement tool used in the evaluation to measure the outcome.**

The WAS is a scale that measures school adjustment, while the PSA measures "academic" school readiness skills such as identifying shapes, counting, letter recognition, etc. Teachers completed the assessments during the first week of Smart Start and again during the final week.

The most recent compelling service outcome for the CDBS program is the improvement in a child's behavior as a result of the family working with the Behavioral Specialist. 20 of the 24 families that engaged in services met some of all of the goals set at the beginning of services. According to the parent surveys that were collected after concluding services, 100% of parents saw some improvement in their child's behavior. 78% reported that they saw "much improvement" and 22% saw "a great deal of improvement." Parents felt better about how to handle their child's behavior (78%). Parents also indicated that they felt they were better prepared to use what they learned to handle their child's behavior (78%). Overall 89 % of parents were satisfied and 11% were mostly satisfied with program services, which reflects that 100% of participants that completed services benefitted from this program. The Behavioral Specialist also measured the parents' skills in working with their child. 31 paren

**Provide the comparison data used to determine whether the service outcome was an improvement and specify the origin of the data.**

The Behavioral Specialist assessed the parents' skill level at the beginning and end of program participation on ten statements based on the Positive Discipline which teaches important social and life skills in a manner that is deeply respectful and encouraging for both children and adults (including parents, teachers, childcare providers, youth workers, and others). Parents were assessed on a five-point scale with five indicating the highest level of skill. The Behavioral Specialist completed the "Pre" assessment after the first home visit where she was able to observe and evaluate the family's interactions. The "Post" assessment was then completed after the last home visit. All families averaged some improvement in their skills. This gain in skills can be directly related to the improvement in the child's behavior and the family's satisfaction as a whole.

**Describe the measurement tool used in the evaluation to measure the outcome.**

The measurement tool used to measure this outcome was the Parent Satisfaction Survey and the Behavioral Specialist's Assessment of Parents' Skills. Going forward, the Child Behavior Checklist 1.5 – 5 will also be used pre and post to gather more concrete data to be analyzed.

Evaluation Findings Reported

Listed below are the Sutter County Children and Families Commissions funded programs evaluation results for 2014/15.

Yuba City Unified School Readiness Program

- The results of the Ages & Stages Questionnaire: Parents assessed their child's developmental milestones using the ASQ. Assessments revealed that half of the children scored below the cutoff on at least one sub domain.

Smart Start

- Positive gains were seen in all seven assessment categories of the Preschool Skills Assessment.

Sutter Smiles Dental Van

The total number of dental procedures delivered over the course of the 11 years has vastly increased from 875 procedures in 03/04 to 6329 this year.

Bright Futures

- Staff saw an unduplicated count of 242 children.
- Ninety-six percent of parents said they learned something at the Bright Futures events that helped them to be a better parent.

Child Development Initiative

Behavioral Specialist facilitated 47 referrals for 31 children.

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- The results of the Retrospective Parent Survey revealed that case-managed families showed a significant increase in measured confidence in advocating for their children demonstrating that program participation did what it was designed to do; increase parents' ability to advocate for their children.

Initiative on Child Health

- A total of 146 immunizations were given.

Lessons Learned

- 100% of childcare educators would recommend the class to other providers.



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**Describe the policy impact of the evaluation results**

SCCFC has conducted independent evaluation of its programs since 2002. The history of program evaluation has been integral to the Commission in determining program funding, funding levels and program planning. The Executive Director monthly meets with program evaluators and program staff to ensure needs are being addressed and program components are strengthened. Mid and Final Program evaluations are presented to the Commission at regularly scheduled meetings.
